I am the Oregon Student State Representative for Be Strong, the nation's largest non-profit, bullying prevention organization. 20.2% of students in grades nine through twelve have been bullied on school property. 29.9% of students felt sad or helpless almost every day, for two or more weeks. 17.7% of students have seriously considered attempting suicide and 8.6% of students have attempted suicide one or more times in the past year. I am not proud of these statistics. They don't even cover all of the United States, much less the world as a whole. My fellow be strong representatives and I are constantly looking for ways to eliminate the some of the hate in this increasingly dark world.

One way I have tried to benefit the places around me is through my school. I work with a committee I have helped organize called the Empowerment Committee.
